3. Mid-term Conference and Seminar Series

After careful consideration, due to the Coronavirus pandemic, the ESA RN23 board decided to cancel the mid-term conference which had been planned for September 2020 at the University of Coimbra, Portugal. We had already issued a call for papers with the theme 'Making a Difference: the hope and promise of sexuality studies', and we had received just over 100 abstracts, but the circumstances made it impossible to proceed with the original plan.
